
# Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Initiates conversations, attends to and takes account of what others say.
- Confident to speak to others about own needs, wants, interests and opinions.
- Takes steps to resolve conflicts with other children, e.g. finding a compromise.
- Can describe self in positive terms and talk about abilities circle time children to talk about what they are good at to encourage aliens to come and visit earth eg. I'm good at sharing toys etc.

# Literacy

- Enjoys an increasing range of books building a larger bank of stories to help support future writing.
- Shows awareness of rhyme and alliteration through stories and phonics sessions children learn to continue a rhyming string of words.
- Suggests how the story might end children to use their own imagination to create different endings to the 'Whatever next' story.
- Hear and says initial sound in words writing an alien party invitation.
- Can segment the sounds in simple words and blend them together –
  playing various games to support their understanding eg. I spy and Silly
  Soup.
- Gives meaning to marks as they draw and paint labelling items they
  would take to the moon and control panel designs.
- Ascribes meanings to marks that they see in different places looking at the front cover and the text in the book, children to find sounds.

### Using Media and Materials

- Understands that different media can be combined to create new effects – children to make papier-mâché planets and rockets using a range of resources.
- Selects tools and techniques needed to shape, assemble and join materials they are using – children to build aliens and spaceships.
- Plays cooperatively as part of a group to develop and act out a narrative – use Whatever next story structure to support their own space adventure stories.
- Constructs with a purpose in mind, using a variety of resources – clean junk modelling for space adventure building eg binoculars/ telescopes.
- Uses simple tools and techniques competently and appropriately.

## Communication and Language

- Able to follow a story without pictures or props listen to the Whatever next story without the pictures.
- Maintains attention, concentrates and sits quietly during appropriate activity.
- Listens and responds to ideas expressed by others in conversation or discussion.
- Introduces a storyline or narrative into their play create their own version of the Whatever next story.
- Extends vocabulary, especially by grouping and naming, exploring the meaning and sounds of new words – children to learn space related vocabulary.

#### Maths

- Counts up to three or four objects by saying one number name for each item – counting out objects for baby bear to take to the moon.
- Recognises numerals 1 to 5 counting songs '5 little men in a flying saucer'.
- Estimates how many objects they can see and checks by counting them.
- Records, using marks that they can interpret and explain making rocket control panels, which will include numbers for a purpose.
- Counts an irregular arrangement of up to ten objects counting space objects and matching them to the correct numeral.
- Beginning to use mathematical names for 'solid' 3D shapes and 'flat' 2D shapes, and mathematical terms to describe shapes – children create rockets using 2D shapes and talking about the shapes they have used and their properties.

# Understanding of the World

- Comments and asks questions about aspects of their familiar world such as the place where they live or the natural world – finding out about space and the planets.
- Can talk about some of the things they have observed such as plants, animals, natural and found objects – looking at astronauts and the work they do in space.
- Looks closely at similarities, differences, patterns and change exploring the different planets and seeing how they look similar and different.
- Knows that information can be retrieved from computers use the internet to find out about rockets/transport and how they travel in space.

# Moving and Handling

- Begins to form recognisable letters within their independent writing.
- Can copy some letters, e.g. letters from their name.
- Handles tools, objects, construction and malleable materials safely and with increasing control – free choice junk modelling.
- Shows increasing control over an object in pushing, patting, throwing, catching or kicking it – team games.
- Negotiates space successfully when playing racing and chasing games with other children, adjusting speed or changing direction to avoid obstacles.

- Begins to build a repertoire of songs and dances.
